You will have received information regarding the new NHS Track and Trace app.



Please could we ask that one parent or carer only comes onto the playground at drop-off and pick-up times. This will help us to adhere to social distancing

Parking Please could you all remember that the school car park is reserved for parents and carers of Apple Class pupils only, and for those transporting very young pre school children.

This will hep us to keep the area safe for all our families.

What will school be like after half term?



There is a possibility that the government will require us to close partially or completely, to support a national circuit-break/fire-break: in this case we will use the school website and Zoom sessions to support you all in some home learning. I anticipate that this would be for one additional week, but I do not have any other information apart from keeping up to date with news and DfE information. As I type, this is merely being discussed as a possibility.

We will still be able to **communicate** by email and by telephone if this is necessary. Please make sure we have up to date contact details for anyone with parental responsibility.

We really hope that we will be able to remain **fully open** throughout the duration of this pandemic. We are relying on your support in this. Please do not relax your behaviours - HANDS - **FACE** - **SPACE**. Use some common sense if you are **travelling over half term** and please ensure your family are tested immediately if you suspect you have symptoms. This will help us all to stay safe and help the school to stay open. Our staff team are all following this advice and taking everyone's safety very seriously indeed.

One **key message** which I am keen to make loud and clear is that no-one must develop a 'blame mentality' over this. We are all minimising risks with our actions. Everyone is taking precautions and we are grateful for you all **keeping a distance in the playground**, for example. However, this is a tricky virus - many other organisations have experienced positive cases despite taking precautions. I will encourage our children to understand that catching Covid-19 is like catching a cold - we can all do things to avoid it but it **can still spread without us being at fault**. Please do support us in this, as it would be very unhealthy and unhelpful for any children, or adult, to feel shame about this unfortunate situation.

There will be some important changes for the coming weeks, as we are anticipating a growing risk of a positive Covid case. It is almost inevitable that our school will be affected. Other very local schools, including Singleton, have already experienced this.

The likely **impact of a positive case** is that the whole 'bubble' will close whilst we, and you, isolate and get tested. In some cases, where schools can guarantee that a child has only mixed closely with a small number of others, then the local Public Health England advisors *could* advise us to keep a bubble open and only those few pupils would need to be tested. This is not what I expect to happen at West Dean: I fully **anticipate closing a whole bubble if and when we have a positive case** in our pupil numbers. In order to maintain a high standard of education, our younger children are collaborating and interacting for a large part of each day. Our older pupils are seated and move around less, but are still near to one another.

If we need to temporarily close a bubble, then we will do all we can to **welcome children back** as soon as it is safe, and we will do all we can to support you with home learning.

I am now wearing a visor when I am in the classroom, corridors and staff room - this will enable me to be in the classrooms more safely with children whilst communicating clearly. (We already have stringent measures in place for visitors to school and our two 'catch up tutors' wear visors too.) Staff will wear face coverings when they are not in their own bubbles.

Our morning routines will remain similar but with some small amendments:

Beech and Chestnut - arrive between 8:30 and 8:35 - we ask families and children to wait on separate sides of the playground as usual. The children will continue to be taken into school in their separate classes, at 8:35 am.

Apple and Maple Classes - arrive between 8:35 and 8:40 - Maple Class should wait near their door and Apple Class on the playground. We will bring them into school once the older pupils have cleared, in groups as they arrive.

Please be as close to these times as possible so that we can manage our staffing to maintain safety and routines.

Once our staff are on the playground, you are welcome to leave your children with us, but you are also welcome to wait, at a safe distance from other parents and other children, in the usual zones.

At the end of the day, we will bring Apple and Maple children out at 2:55, to avoid families having to wait as long on the playground.

Beech and Chestnut Classes will leave separately between 2:55 and 3pm, to maintain distances between them and the younger pupils.

Please support us in arriving and leaving promptly, without queuing near the gate. Please practise social distancing and stay safe in the car parks too.

We will do a Zoom **assembly** in school on Monday afternoons, but will not sing indoors due to added risks. On other days, we will bring the **whole school together outside**, for our assemblies: we will be spaced out, and we will learn about Christianity, bible stories, Aesop's fables, and Christmas as well as celebrating achievement. We will also sing songs together and move around to keep warm. Singing and playing together outside is considerably safer than indoors, so we will do this whenever the weather and timetable allow.

Learning at home: how you can help your children.

One of the main barriers for children now that we are back is regaining high expectations – in presentation, attention to detail, using precise and correct vocabulary, for example. You can help by keeping an eye on the maths words of the week, to support with good use of vocabulary, as this really helps us all to think our learning through and to understand concepts. (Try, for example, describing how a flower works if you don't know the subject specific vocabulary 'leaf, petal and stalk'. If we cannot explain things clearly, we cannot think about them clearly.)

It is more important than ever to **support with homework** and to ensure that your expectations at home match the teachers' expectations, as closely as possible.

For some children, handwriting and presentation are not as strong as they would usually be at this time in the children's schooling. You can help by practising letter formation, if you are confident with this: however, it may be just as effective to encourage fine motor activities such as lego, hamma beads, playdough/plasticine modelling, threading beads, sewing, cutting and sticking, weaving wool/string around cardboard shapes, pegging out the laundry, chopping and grating food, jigsaw puzzles, painting, drawing and colouring, using chopsticks (!) etc. There are numerous websites and pinterest sources for activities. Climbing on play equipment and developing the muscles in the arms and upper body really helps children control their pencils too - this is called developing the 'shoulder girdle'.

Most children would benefit from more talking, believe it or not! If you are watching TV, talk to them about the storyline and characters – encourage them to express their opinions fully and in full sentences. When they are a 'captive audience' in the car, depending on their age, you can talk about a subject where they have to give their opinion and explain themselves. You can do quick fire mental maths, sing rhyming songs, play guessing games and think of as many objects of one type as you can (eg: types of car, colours, adjectives for the weather, adverbs which describe how people or animals move/eat/talk etc).

Let's do all we can, together, to build our children's learning skills & boost their confidence.


