Dear Parents and Carers,

We have a lot of news for you this week and several attachments to share with you. We also have a small team of reporters who will be contributing to the Valley Diary, and who may be able to contribute here too in the future newsletters. My thanks go to Alex and Elizabeth, for telling us all about their exciting learning experiences this week.

Following on from last week's spelling support documents; we have two charts of 'feedback' codes and symbols. This should help you to make sense of the **feedback/marking** in children's books. Sometimes children evaluate their own and other children's work using these codes, but they are mainly used by our teachers and teaching assistants, to help children to know exactly what their 'next steps' are. There is also a document which explains the expectations for the use of **grammar and punctuation** for children by the time they reach the end of Year 6: this is quite demanding for many adults and I hope that it is useful for you all to see the examples and explanations included. Please refer to this with your Y5/6 children and use it for your own reference. It is not designed for use with younger children, but I hope that it gives a clear picture of where we are all aiming for!

We have also begun to publish the maths questions again: the year group specific questions are based on data interpretation this week. It is interesting to see the progression in expectations from Y2 to Y6.

Also attached is a leaflet which is aimed at supporting parents and carers who are worried about **children's mental health** issues. We work very hard in school to support children in being positive and resilient, in dealing with making mistakes and with tricky social situations. The service offered is for more serious concerns - I hope that this information is helpful. Please do come and see me if you have any concerns of this nature and we will do our best to provide support and advice. It often helps just to talk these things through.

Please do consult the calendar for opportunities to come into school and be involved in the learning, and note that parents' consultation evenings are fast approaching - book now to secure a day and time convenient for you to attend.

### PTA

It was a lovely start to the day on Thursday of this week, to have a relaxed opportunity to chat and stop for a moment with a cup of tea or coffee and a biscuit. Our PTA committee did a super job of arranging this and are keen to make this a regular event - please see the attached flyer for more information. ### International Schools Award

As a result of funding gained through the British Council to enable 5 members of our staff to participate in language immersion courses in France, we have gained the International Schools Award. This is in recognition of the hard work by members of staff to bring language and culture to life throughout school, for example our C'est Fantastique show, which had the whole school involved and engaged. We have been able to share and celebrate our learning with the children, begun a French after school club, taken part in our residential visit in Normandy, joined in the Chartres Art Competition, had a French themed Community Café and a dance themed around cultural divides for 'Dance House'. We have all had the opportunity to join in and celebrate in many ways. Our next 'adventure' will be a further language immersion course in Santander in 2018 when we will begin work for our summer term topic, which will focus on Spain, it's traditions and culture, language, food, dress and religion. We are hoping to rekindle links with our colleagues in our twinned Mexico schools and to revisit our studies on Edward James and surrealism with the help of our governor, Dr Sharon-Michi Kusunoki. We are very lucky that the school has this rich heritage and hope to use this to inspire the children – to find out more, you may have to wait until the Summer term! We are now a registered 'e-twinning' school which will enable us to make links with schools in other countries.

### School Funding

You will be aware, from local and national press, and from information sent out from school, that there is a funding crisis in education. I have received numerous requests to send out letters informing you all of the details and impact of the real term cuts to our budgets, some of which I have chosen to send out. Although I don't want to alarm you or inundate you with paper, I feel it is important to draw your attention to a campaign calling for action next week, by parents and teachers. Some schools will be 'putting their arms around their schools' and posting images on social media to highlight the situation. I do not propose that we at West Dean do this (one or two local schools may do so). However, I would like to pass on the following information:

On 14 September the Secretary of State for Education Justine Greening gave a statement on a revised funding formula for schools in which she openly acknowledged that many schools have been underfunded. While the new funding formula (which determines how the funding pot is divided between schools) is welcome, it does not solve the funding crisis.

That's because there is no new money available from the Treasury under the revised formula. The one-off payment spread over two years announced on 14 September amounts to no more than smoke and mirrors: taking money from other budgets within the Department for Education, such as healthy meals and sports provision. School leaders say they need at least £2 billion in additional funding per year; the government's current offer leaves our schools facing real-terms cuts of 4.6 percent, according to the IFS.

For children, this could means fewer qualified teachers, the loss of valuable teaching assistants, soaring class sizes, the loss of enrichment activities in schools and a narrowing curriculum. Our children only get one chance at their education and parents across the land are uniting with teachers to say they won't stand by and watch this happen.

On 4 October, schools in areas including Brighton, Birmingham, Manchester, West Sussex, Lancaster, Morecambe, Isle of Wight, Devon, and London will join in this action – teachers, parents and children simultaneously linking arms around their local schools in a symbolic act of protection. The funding crisis in education has not been resolved and campaigners are sending a clear message to the government that they stand united in their demand for more money for schools in the Autumn Budget on  $22^{nd}$  November 2017.

In addition to this, it is alarming to note that there is a huge amount of additional funding available to some schools...... As the educational environment has changed over the last few years, some schools have become 'standalone academies', some have formed academy chains, some have been 'taken over' by academy chains and some have merged/reorganized/amalgamated/federated etc. In addition to this, some have become 'teaching schools' and we now have some 'Free Schools'. Fewer and fewer state schools exist, supported by the local educational authorities, but this is what our school has chosen to do, as have the other GAS schools (apart from Tangmere, who were taken over by TKAT). This additional funding is available to groups of schools such as teaching school alliances and academy chains to bid for. Local authorities are also able to bid for funding. It appears, from information brought to us by the local authority, that, even if our local teaching schools alliances were effective in bidding for such funding, West Dean is unlikely to benefit as are not part of such a group and not 'vulnerable' in terms of standards. Our locality of Headteachers are currently trying to make sense of this new situation, and to find ways of accessing further targeted funding, without spending time accessing funds which merely go to benefit children in schools other than our own.

We will keep you abreast of changes, and I hope to reassure you that our budget is still strong. We are highly unlikely to undertake any substantial building work in the near future, however, and even the maintenance of the building/cloakroom refurbishment is likely to be a financial challenge. We have not, as yet, been put into the position that hundreds of schools are in, where parents are being asked to make regular contributions to fund the education of their children and we very much hope not to have to do this. Our PTA has supported us so well, and we are extremely grateful for this. We ask that you support them in any way you can, as we work hard to prioritise staffing, resourcing and fabulous learning experiences for our children.

Please do keep your eyes open for ways to support the campaigns in any way you can.
